“Jesus, the good news is you’ve come to destroy hostilities; to tear down walls of division; to make peace and be our peace. You reconcile enemies to God and to one another, so I am confident you are faithfully at work in these tense and complicated situations. But my confidence doesn’t mask my weariness. How long, O Lord? How long before the Day when we no longer misrepresent you to our watching world? How long before the Day of no more bitterness or brokenness? It took time plus grace for Paul and Barnabas to get back together. I don’t know what “time plus grace” will look like in each of these painful stories. To the extent you would have me get involved, help me listen from the heart and offer a nonanxious presence. Help me pray in the Spirit, reason from the Scriptures, and love by the gospel. Help me to wait upon you, Lord, and not just weigh my options.”
